Message from ...


Hello club,

Tech Tips

The Ammeter

The Model A ammeter is a fairly simple device, but it can tell you a lot if you pay attention to it. It is a center off type meter. The needle sits on zero in the center when no current is being drawn. When current is being drawn from the battery the needle points to the negative side. The reading depends on how much current is being drawn. When the generator (or alternator) is sending current to the battery to charge it, the needle points to the positive side. The reading depends on how much current is being passed to the battery.

Original ammeters have "bounce" to them. This is because they are undamped. In this manner they quickly read any variations in current flow. Many reproduction ammeters are not made very well and are damped and move very sluggishly.

If the ignition circuit is wired to receive its power through the ammeter it provides a diagnostic tool. When starting the car the ammeter will bounce back and forth on either side of the zero mark before it starts. This is caused by the points opening and closing. If the car fails to start the bouncing ammeter needle is telling you that there is nothing wrong ignition primary with the circuit and the problem is somewhere else. If the needle

is not bouncing, the problem is likely in the ignition primary circuit.

The original Model A generator is usually adjusted for a fixed 8-amp output. It will produce 8-amps regardless of the electrical load requirement or the status of the battery. When driving at night the generator cannot provide all the current demand from the headlights. The battery is then required to supply the balance and the ammeter will show a discharge. Over a long period of nighttime driving the battery will become discharged. When diving on a long trip during the day the continuous 8-amps may over charge the battery and boil the water out of it. Either case is not healthy for the battery.

Years ago it was quite common to see cars such as the Model A on a long stretch of open highway with their headlights on during the day to protect the battery by absorbing the excessive output current from the generator.

When a Model A is equipped with an alternator (either 6-volt or 12-volt) the ammeter becomes even more of a diagnostic tool and the battery remains fully charged most of the time.

The alternator has an internal regulator circuit that constantly looks at the status of the battery. If the battery needs charging the alternator sends the appropriate amount of current to it to bring it

back up to full charge. This will occur right after start up when the starter has drawn a significant amount of current out of the battery. The ammeter will then show a high charging rate going to the battery. A few miles down the road and the ammeter will move toward zero indicating the battery is almost fully charged. On a long trip the ammeter should be sitting at zero indicating the battery is fully charged and no current is going to it.

When the headlights are turned on the alternator immediately picks up the load and the ammeter remains at zero indicating that no current is being drawn from the battery to power the headlights.

On a relatively long drive if the ammeter does not return to zero it is telling you that there is a defective cell in the battery that is preventing it from becoming fully charged. The ammeter is telling you it is time to have the battery checked.

Have you been to a Model A meet and entered fashion judging? Maybe you are putting together an outfit that you plan to have judged at the next

Misses' Sizes: 14 to 20 (to fit 32 to 38 bust). See Scale of Sizes on page 14. National Meet. Have you looked in the MAFCA Fashion Judging Procedures Manual and seen the forms that have to be filled out? Hopefully you forged ahead and said—'I am still going to enter fashion judging in spite of the forms and descriptions that I have to undertake!'

You will receive a sample page to follow along with the fashion judging forms once you decide to enter fashion judging, but it only gives the very basics needed. It would be beneficial to have additional, descriptive information on your entry form. Look at the sample in the MAFCA Fashion Judging Procedures Manual, Section 2, Forms, Page 4. Be imaginative.

A more complete description draws the attention of the judges to the finer details of the item. Here are some ideas to 'spice' up your entry description. Rather than just saying "a dress with a full skirt!", add some pizazz! It could say "a soft, circular, flowing skirt to match the curved lines on the collar." By broadening your description, the judges have a better understanding of the beauty and authenticity of the item being brought before them.

Look in catalogs and magazines and you will find that they give great descriptions. You can almost picture in your mind exactly what the ensemble looks like with a detailed description.

The example below has lots of room for a description...separate matching jacket, blouse attaches to the flowing skirt, comfortable for walking, flared cuffs on the jacket sleeves, self-belt trimmed with a buckle (if you know what the buckle is made of, include that in your description), and an eye catching ruffle on the blouse. Be creative!

<u> Major Garment:</u>

Late afternoon blue and tan chiffon



dress with a bertha collar. Suggestions....

Collar is daintily tucked.

Collar is edged with lace to match the flared cuffs on the sleeves.

The dress has an uneven hemline which drapes into graceful flowing lines.

The dress has a side-tie fastening that draws the waist in to give a semi-fitted look. Picot edging finishes the hemline and the neckline.

If multiple fabrics are used, don't be afraid to say that they complement each other.







<u>H e a d g e a r /</u> <u>Hairdo</u>:

Hair styled in finger waves with a rhinestone hair clip. Suggestions....

Hair is short and styled in tight finger

waves. Shape of the hair cliplarge or small

If you are wearing a hat, describe it in detail such as... Self-bow at the side adding flattery

Bow completes the crown beautifully Close fitting crown or Cleverly scalloped brim with blue and white ribbon trim

Outer garment-Long coat Suggestions....

All wool coat with unique sleeve detailing Type of wool could be described

Stitching on the cuffs and belt matches the stitching on the face framing collar

Belt is of same fabric and has the same flattering stitching and is accented with a gold buckle If by chance you are wearing a shawl, give information as to the fabric, where found, length of fringe and/or length or width of shawl. Maybe you could even say it matches perfectly with the color of shoes or the major garment.

Accessories:

Clear crystal 2 strand necklace... Suggestions....

Give the type of fastener on the necklace

You might say a brilliantly becoming necklace of clear crystals Matching silver and clear crystal drop earrings with screw backs



Leather Purse

Suggestions....

Lining, color or fabric Compartments Type of handle or if it's a clutch, Is there a back strap? Design on the flap

Whiting and Davis blue and tan purse complements the color of the major garment

Additional information:

Hair and nails done in era fashion.

Always be sure to include what you have done to go above and beyond to achieve the look of the Model A era. Be sure to bring dated documentation of items not pictured or described in the MAFCA Fashion Guidelines. You can find documentation in catalogs and magazines dated through the Model A years.

It also is helpful to add the MAFCA Fashion Guidelines reference to the section, page and item that closely resembles your item. A judge can flip to the page and see the item thus reducing time and stress in the judging room.

The Brand Icon of Michelin Tires: Vintage Terrifying Photos of the Original Michelin Man

The world of marketing and advertising has witnessed numerous brand icons that have left an indelible mark on the collective consciousness. Among these iconic figures, one stands out with its unique blend of charm and terror: the Michelin Man.

The story of the Michelin Man begins in 1894 when the Michelin brothers, André and Édouard, founded the Michelin Tire Company in France. Seeking a distinctive brand identity, they turned to the world of advertising.

While attending the Universal and Colonial Exposition in Lyon, the brothers noticed a stack of tires that suggested to Édouard the figure of a man without arms.

Four years later, André met French cartoonist Marius Rossillon, popularly known as O'Galop, who showed him a







rejected image he had created for a Munich brewery—a large, regal figure holding a huge glass of beer and quoting Horace's phrase Nunc est bibendum ("Now is the time for drinking").

Andréimmediately suggested replacing the man with a figure made from tires, and O'Galop adapted the earlier image into Michelin's symbol. This unusual and striking persona would soon take on a life of its own.

The 1898 poster showed him offering the toast Nunc est bibendum to his scrawny Brand X competitors with a glass full of road hazards, with the title and tag C'est à dire: À votre santé. Le pneu Michelin boit l'obstacle ("Now is the time to drink!! Which is to say: 'To your health, the Michelin tire drinks down the obstacle[s]!").

The character's glass is filled with nails and broken glass, implying that Michelin tires will easily take on road hazards.

As the decades unfolded, the Michelin Man underwent a metamorphosis, evolving from a mere graphic representation to a three-dimensional figure with a rich personality.

However, it was during his early years that the Michelin Man left an indelible impression on the collective consciousness.

These vintage photographs offer a mesmerizing glimpse into the origin and evolution of this iconic symbol.



This horse-drawn advertising carriage is from 1911. The two Michelin men, made of tires, look like they materialized out of a nightmare.

Rubber tires were originally gray-white, or light or translucent beige. In 1912, they became black when carbon was added to them as a preservative and strengthener.

The company changed Bibendum's color to black as well, and featured him that way in several print ads.

They decided to abandon the change, citing printing and aesthetic issues (not racial concerns, as is commonly believed).

The image of the plump tire-man is sometimes used to describe an obese person, or someone wearing comically bulky clothing (e.g. "How can I wrap up warmly without looking like the Michelin Man?").



An advertising vehicle from 1926. Because tires were whitish-gray in the early 1900s, Bibendum was white.

Bibendum's shape has changed over the years. O'Galop's logo was based on bicycle tires, wore pince-nez glasses with lanyard, and smoked a cigar.

By the 1960s, Bibendum was shown running, often rolling a tire as well, and no longer smoked. In 1998, his 100th anniversary, a slimmed-down version of him (sans glasses) was adopted, reflecting the lower-profile, smaller tires of modern cars.

A computer-animated version of Bibendum has appeared in American television ads, with a pet puppy similar in appearance to him.

The Michelin tyre drinks up obstacles!' The idea was that Michelin tyres 'drank' up any obstructions in their way -Bibendum's raised glass is full of broken debris.
